Gain a better understanding of your synagogue through the eyes of your members with the Thriving Synagogue Learning Tool. Originally designed by UJA-Federation of New York and Brandeis University, this web-based survey administered by Social Research Lab at University of Northern Colorado creates a snapshot of your synagogue, and a comparison alongside peer congregations. This Profile of Thriving is an easy-to-read report full of rich detail and helpful data which will help your leadership make informed, strategic decisions for the future.

How does it work?

This web-based process takes approximately four months. During that time:

Leadership promotes the Learning Tool for one month to optimize the survey response rate. The higher your response rate, the more robust your results.
